THANK YOU for your compassion and generosity in 2020.





32,000 masks and sanitizer kits provided

Partnered with H.E.Butt Foundation and the Family Independence Institute to provide **398 grants of \$500 to struggling families.**

Distributed 500 "It's going to be O.K." books about COVID to children in partnership with H.E.Butt Foundation.



Assisted **220 job seekers** with finding new employment and **launched technology literacy classes** to help our community find jobs in a virtual world.

We began a new partnership with the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) and the South Alamo Regional Alliance for the Homeless to provide permanent housing funds for the homeless and homeless prevention dollars for those facing eviction.


